The Woodlands are fast being carpeted with wild flowers of every color and hue. The first coppy mimosas are out, and by the end of the week will be plentiful. The calla lilies of several shades, the gladioli and the little wild pansies, the blue and white forget-me-nots, the cornflowers, the ferns and delicate wildflowers are also making their appearance, and before very long will have reached their full development. Mistletoe ferns are being transplanted very satisfactorily, and will come up each year, thicker and more luxuriant. In digging the plants up it is necessary to wrap them immediately in paper to protect the earth falling away from the roots. A basket full of black lead mold or earth from around a fern and covered tea will enrich the fern bed when the plants are planted. An old stump should be in so, longwise, in a marked place. In an average position, make good boxes of coconuts for the ferns, which should be planted thickly.
