

SENATORS TIRED OF SWELTERING IN HEAT, HASTEN WORK

Finish Schedules Of Tariff Bill In Seventy Days, And Take Short Rest

CORPORATION TAX COMES UP IMMEDIATELY

Would Like To Postpone This Question But It would Embarrass Taft

(By Associated Press.) WASHINGTON, June 28.—After seventy days of almost continuous debate in the senate at 3.45 p. m., concluded its discussion of the schedules of the Payne-Aldrich tariff bill. Five minutes afterwards the senate adjourned for the day to permit the slight preparation possible in so short a time for the debate on the corporation and income tax questions, which will begin soon after the senate convenes tomorrow morning at ten o'clock.

STRIKE SETTLED IN PITTSBURG AT END OF SECOND DAY

Mayor of City Got Both Sides Together And Gave Them Good Talking to

AGREEMENT IS TO LAST FOR MANY YEARS

Disturbances at Car Barns Portended Long Drawn Out Struggle

(By Associated Press.) PITTSBURG, Pa., June 28.—At 10.30 tonight the street railway strike which has cost the city of Pittsburgh over \$200,000 in two days was officially declared to be at an end. In the private offices of Mayor William A. Magee articles were signed by officials of the Pittsburgh railway company and an executive committee from the Amalgamated Association of Street and Electric Railway Employees which will years to come prevent another tie-up of the 4,000 miles of street railway tracks in and about Greater Pittsburgh and Allegheny county. The strike, it developed tonight, was the outcome of but two points of difference between the car company and the motorman and conductors, one being the alleged neglect upon the part of the car company to shorten "swing runs" and the other the refusal of the railway officials to reinstate discharged men without proper hearing.
