JAILER FOUND PRISONER WALKING ABOUT TOWN. Told How 'Another Prisoner Had Opened up the Doors of the Jail.

(By Associated Press) JAILER BROWN, of the City Jail, who was found walking about town yesterday morning about 3 o'clock, after having escaped one of the prisoners, Fred Astor, who is held in the jail for a murder charge, was found in a hurry about leaving the jail.

Upon investigation it was found that all the doors were locked as they were left last night. Astor says that the other negro, Fred Evans, broke out of the cells with a crowbar, which was left by the workmen who had been putting in a new cell, and then he locked the locks with a wire. How he secured the crowbar on the inside of the cell and how the outside door was opened, which cannot be ascertained from the inside, is a mystery and explains one thing that he had outside assistance. There were only three men in the jail at the time and the negro Bill Evans is still at large.
