Mayor of Virginia Town Had Elaborate Scheme For Holding up RR. WAS PROMINENT AS LAWYER IN STATE

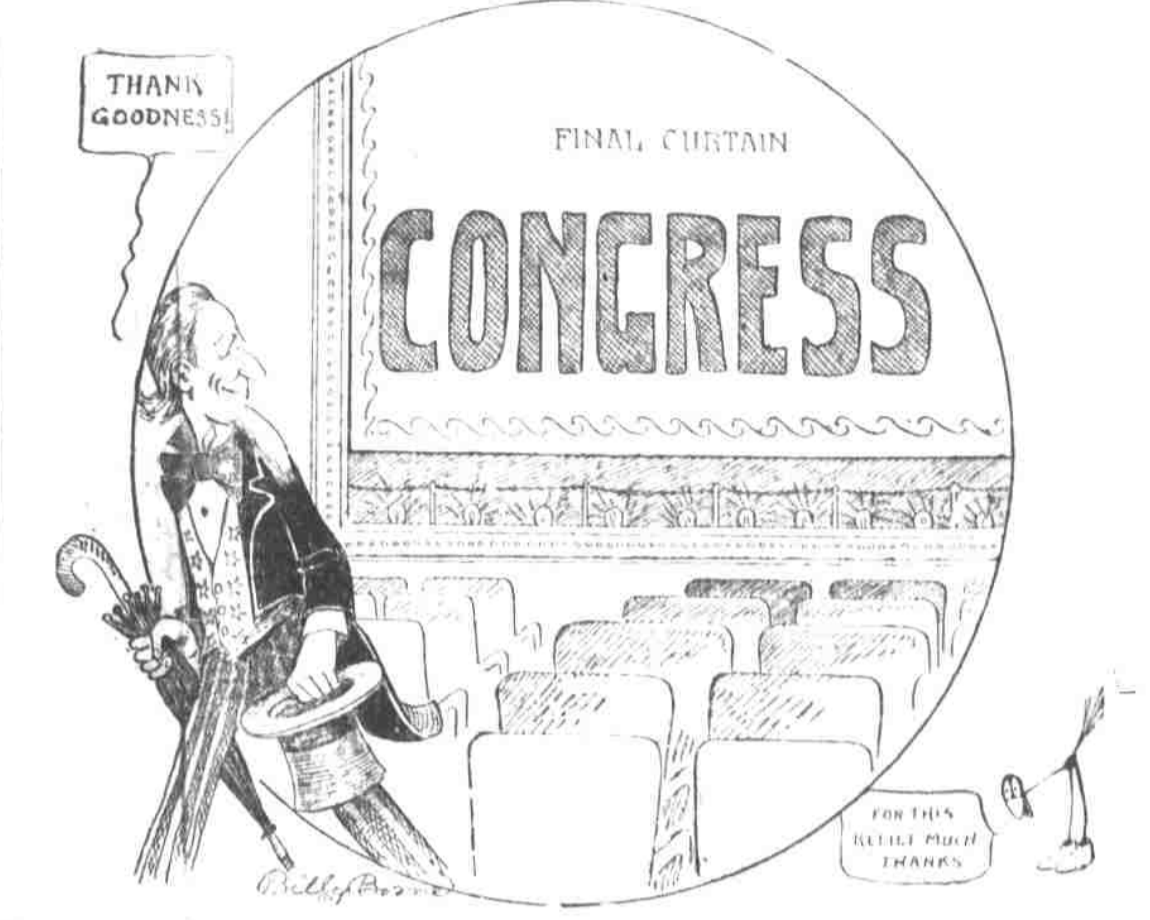

BANK EXAMINERS TELL OF THE CONDITION OF OLD FIRST NATIONAL
