ROBERTSON HANGS OUT NEW RECORD AT LOWELL TRACK

He Kept The Lead After An Exciting Fight For Position &

100,000 PEOPLE

Harry Grant at One Time Had Chance For Victory But Fell

(By Associated Press.)

LOWELL, Mass., Sept. 8 - With the same daring coolness and judgment which have marked his exploits on other motor tracks, George H. Robertson drove his Simplex car 318 miles to victory today over the Merrimack Valley circuit and left trailing behind or out of commission, sixteen other aspirants for the Lowell trophy in the second national Stock Chassis race Robertson maintained a speed to the five hours, fifty-two minutes, one and two-niths seconds. of 54.2 miles an hour, which was six tenths better than the average made More than twenty minutes after

Pobertson had flown over the finish line, A. L. Poole, driving the Italian Isotta-Franchini, flashed umber the wire in second place, having jumped into that josition on the last lap. E. H. Parker in a Fiat captured

Nearly one hundred thousand per sons saw Robertson and Herbert Lytle fight it out for the lead in the first eleven laps of the 10.6 miles circuit. Then Robertson dashed to the fore and kept the lead until twenty of the thirty laps had been covered, when a siop of several minutes was required to stoke and oil up. Harry Grant, in an Alco, and Ralph De Palma, in a Fiat, began cutting down Robertson's lead, but before they caught him the sturdy Simplex driver was up and

Robertson's stop seemed to have robbed him of speed, for with loss than forty miles to go, Grant caught him and took the lead later, however, as the Alco car was racing up the back stretch it capsized and broke its chain, and Robertson again took the lead and was never headed
