LATTER HAD TO BEG EVEN TO GET IN AT ALL

Friend of the Doctors Tells of Incident as Related to Him

COPENHAGEN, Sept. 12. A remarkable letter, received by Dr. Cook's... A Cook's version of the trouble with Commander Peary over supplies and... the letter was written by Dr. Norman... a prominent Danish physician who several times visited Greenland to study the diseases which he has made a specialty of.

Dr. Cook told practically the same story to one of his closest American friends just a week ago, before Commander Peary's reappearance, but said that he did not intend to make it public.

PRESIDENT TAFT BEGINS HIS SWING THROUGH THE WEST

Will Cover Over Twelve Thousand Miles in His Two Months' Journey

PRESIDENT DIAZ WILL MEET HIM AT BORDER

Will Take In Sights in Wonderful Country Through Which He Passes

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 12. When President Taft makes his Boston trip today, he will be the guest of the chamber of commerce at a dinner that evening, he will have a grandly started on one of the most notable trips ever taken by a chief executive of the United States. After spending the night at a hotel in Boston, the president will leave at 10 a. m. on Wednesday, on the first stage of his four-part journey, the first stopping place being at Chicago, where Mr. Taft will be entertained part of the day by the Commercial club, and the remainder of his stay by the Hamilton club.

Leading through thirty states and parts of the Southwestern territories, the president's trip will reach its climax at El Paso, Texas, on October 15, where he will meet President Diaz, of Mexico.

Covers Many Miles. After Mr. Taft has formally received President Diaz at El Paso, he will cross the International bridge to Ciudad Juarez, officially to return the call. During the evening of the sixteenth President Taft will be entertained at a state dinner on Mexican soil. President Diaz will be entertained at luncheon at El Paso.

The president's trip covers an itinerary of 12,750 miles and his private cars, the Mayflower and the Hindemere will be handled by over twenty-two railroad systems. The Southern Pacific will get the longest haul of 2,283 miles. The Maricopa and Phoenix railroad away out in Arizona, the shortest haul of thirty-five miles.
