Y.W.C.A. MAKES BID FOR MORE MEMBERS

WILL INAUGURATE CAMPAIGN WITH SUPPER TO COMMITTEES

Splendid Work Done By Institution Is Sufficient Proof of Its Usefulness.

And now it is the Young Women's Christian association, Committees are meeting and work is being planned for the autumn and winter, and the board of directors is hoping that every girl and woman of Asheville is going to find some reason for a genuine interest in this organization.

In the first place, the association in the two years of its existence has abundantly proved itself. It has shown a need for a refined boarding house for self-supporting young women, and has maintained it after the initial expense of furnishing was met, on a self-supporting basis. Moreover, it has preserved to the city a fine old property, and made a marked improvement in a conspicuous part of a main business street.

Having done so much, however, the association is not content to let that end the tale. With approximately eight hundred young women employed in the city, and many more who are comparatively at leisure in their own homes, but have nevertheless various needs of development, the association seeks a distinct field to be occupied. To undertake this, the board of directors is anxious and is definitely planning to enlarge the work, making the association an agency to meet all the needs of all the young women of the city, to the greatest possible extent. To that end, committees are planning educational advantages in the way of classes and clubs, social features that will furnish a wholesome attractive fellowship for all girls, and religious work where it can supplement the work already being done in the churches.

A practical step, to get all these activities launched will be the membership campaign which the membership committee decided upon at an important meeting last Saturday.
