KENTUCKIANS READY TO SHOOT OVER ELECTION

Compromise Arranged Between Factions and Armed Men Disperse.

JACKSON, Ky., Oct. 30.—A compromise entered into by the leaders of the democratic and republican factions in this county this morning which has existed was relieved today when it was agreed that the factions for all but three precincts which were recently removed from a ballot book of voters should be delivered to the sheriff at the election regardless of political affiliation. The crowds of excited prospective voters, adherents of the respective tickets, which have swarmed into Jackson on the last two days, many of them heavily armed, began to disperse shortly after the announcement of the compromise, and it is further expected that there will not be further serious rioting. The ballot for the three reserved precincts are to be turned over to the election officers early Tuesday.
