BATTLE CASE OPENS FOR TRIAL AT GREENSBORO

Case Involving Alleged Irregularities while Cashier May Take up Week
 GREENSBORO, N. C., Nov. 22.—The trial of Lee H. Battle, charged with irregularities while cashier of the former City National Bank of this city was brought up in the Federal court here today. There were no suggestions of a continuance from either side, jury being selected in fifteen minutes and Assistant District Attorney Coble proceeded to read the bill of indictment. Of eight counts for false entries the largest is on the sworn report of January 1896, where under the head of "loans exceeding the limit," the report says "none" while the allegation in the bill of indictment is that the bank had a loan to the Thomas Cotton Manufacturing company of which Mr. Battle was president, amounting to \$149,000.
 Fred A. Hull, national bank examiner will be the first witness for the government tomorrow. The case will probably consume the entire week.


