One of the most interesting sales of relics occurred recently when Miss Mary Custis Lee, of Richmond, Va., sold to the Valley Forge Museum of Pennsylvania, for \$5,000, the George Washington tent in which the "Father of his Country" lived during the Revolutionary war.
