BASEBALL FANS ARE MOST READY FOR WORK

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION DIRECTED FOR ASSOCIATION

Prospects for Successful Season Are Becoming Brighter Every Day Now

At a meeting of the stockholders of the Asheville Baseball association at the city hall last night, several matters of importance were considered. Mr. S. G. Bernard, who kindly donated his services to the association, was instructed to draw up articles of incorporation for the association as soon as possible. When the charter is issued a meeting of the stockholders will be held when directors will be chosen and officers elected.

A bit of news that will prove interesting to lovers of the national game here is that Lave Cross of the Charlotte team has expressed his intention of letting Asheville's Jimmie Hayes during the entire season. Hayes is here for his health, and his physician has stated that he will be able to play ball in this climate, but to return to Charlotte would prove detrimental to his health.

The matter of giving passes to stockholders of the association came up for discussion. It was decided to issue no passes to stockholders. This would tend to reduce the gate receipts and would probably cause trouble in settling with visiting teams who would play on a percentage basis as they would object to a great number of passes. Also that the stockholders think that there is no use of issuing passes, as they are of the opinion that every man who invests \$5 in the organization will get at least \$25 out of it, as they think this will be a successful season here. It is practically assured that each stockholder will receive the amount he invests and it is quite probable that dividends will be paid as a capital of \$2,500 will allow the management to secure a team which will make the Asheville gate receipts swell. If the stockholders at the end of the season believe the franchise a large dividend will probably be paid, but the present indications are that a stockholder in the Asheville Baseball association will sooner think of parting with standard Oil stock or United Steel securities than his baseball stock.

Enquiries are being received from many players of note concerning the prospects for getting a tryout on the Asheville team. Truly, the baseball bug is buzzing.

ASHEVILLE MAN DIES IN RICHMOND HOTEL
