COTTON MILLS TO CONSOLIDATE

BOSTON, Mass., March 1.—Plans are being made by Boston financiers to consolidate nine cotton mill properties in South Carolina. The mills are the Victor, Monaghan, Apache, Greens, Olympia, Granby, Richard, Capital City and Beaver Dam Mills, all situated in the vicinity of Columbia and Greenville. The consolidated company is capitalized at \$10,000,000. The nine plants have a total of 357,352 spindles.
