STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA, COUNTY OF HUNCOMBE, THE TOWN OF BLACK MOUNTAIN, NOTICE OF ELECTION

To the Qualified Voters of the Town of Black Mountain: TAKE NOTICE, That the mayor and board of aldermen of the town of Black Mountain, by virtue of the power and authority reposed in them by law, do hereby order an election by the qualified voters of the said town upon the question of the issuance of bonds by said town to the amount of fifteen thousand dollars—the bonds to be of the par value of one hundred dollars each, payable thirty years after their date, and bear interest from their date at the rate of six per centum per annum, interest payable semi-annually, with interest coupons attached—for the purpose of constructing and installing a water-works and sewerage system for the said town; the said election to be held from sunrise to sunset on Tuesday, the 11th day of April, 1911, at the store of W. C. Hall in said town.
