The Woman's Guild of Trinity church will meet with Mrs. Jensen, 15 Blake street, Thursday at 3:30.

Rev. Mr. Bettscher who has been interested in missionary work in Alaska for several years and who has been in the city for a brief visit, lectured at the parish house in Biltmore Tuesday evening and showed a number of pictures of Alaska, the slides used on the stereopticon being made from pictures taken by Mr. Bettscher.
