### JUDGEMENT IS ASKED FOR COUNTY TAXES

Commissioners Want Court to Pass Upon Back Taxes Due on Old Concrete Hotel.

In the office of the clerk of the court has been filed a bill of complaint in the case of Buncombe county and the board of county commissioners against Eugene Way, W. P. Carter and J. V. Ingle, in which the county is suing for back taxes.

The complaint sets forth that the state and county taxes on the property on which the unfinished hotel stands at the corner of West College and North Main street amounted to \$421 for the year 1908; \$501.20 for 1907 and \$455.70 for 1906, the property having been sold and bought in by the county commissioners each of the three years.

The plaintiffs are praying for a judgment of \$1,378.10.

It will be recalled that tender was made for payment of these taxes, but that on account of the fact that the commissioners had made contracts for the collection of back taxes the terms of which were not filled the tender was refused. This suit is regarded as a friendly one to get a decision from the court regarding the points involved.
