FEDERAL PRISONERS ARE BROUGHT HERE

Five Attempted to Escape From Jail at Brevard and Brought Here for Safe Keeping.

Deputy Marshal Beason and Mr. Eiro returned from Brevard yesterday with Billy Owens, J. W. Carpenter, John Shelton, Jeff Brown and H. C. Golden, who were transferred from the Transylvania county jail to the jail of this county for safe keeping.

During this week these prisoners with several others came near making their escape by the means of tools furnished them by an outside party. Save for the rasping noise made by a saw, which woke the jailer, their purpose would have been accomplished.

Billy Owens a few days prior to the attempt made by the prisoners to escape, was released on a bond of \$500 furnished by his friends. Owens, it is said, had three brothers-in-law in the same jail, and he was suspected of assisting the escape by furnishing a saw. The grand jury in session there this week investigated the matter and returned a true bill against him for assisting the prisoners in their attempt to escape, by furnishing a saw and a rope by which to let themselves down after effecting an opening for an exit.

The prisoners brought here yesterday are held by the government. All are charged with illegal whiskey operations in some of the counties of the western part of the state. Carpenter is said to be a brother-in-law of Owens, the other brother-in-law

Judge Murphy is well acquainted with many of the large number of educators who meet annually, having met with them twice before this. In his efforts to secure the next meeting board of trade and the city of Asheville.

This is the annual conference of which Mr. Odgen of New York is the president. The program for the conference this year was published in The Citizen several days ago. It is of special interest to Asheville that the active secretary of the conference is Prof. P.
