LENOIR, April 29.—A new schedule goes into effect on the Carolina & Northwestern railway next Sunday, the 30th. The most important change affecting Lenoir is the night train from Hickory, arriving here at 1 a. m. instead of 10 p. m. as heretofore. By this change passengers from the north and east are enabled to reach Lenoir without having to spend the night in Hickory, as formerly, as this train will make connection with the Southern train No. 25, bring both mail and passengers. It is thought probable that the railroad company will put on their regular summer trains, Nos. 7 and 8, a little later.
