The commencement exercises of the University of North Carolina begin Saturday, May 27, and will be continued until the following Tuesday when the annual address will be delivered by Gov. Woodrow Wilson, of New Jersey. Quite a number of Asheville people, many of whom are graduates, will go to Chapel Hill for the commencement. One of the most interesting features will be the conferring of the degree of A. B. upon all students of the university who, during the period from 1861 to 1865, withdrew to enter the military or naval service in the civil war. A large number of the former students will be present to receive their degrees in person and a general reunion of all the students of that period will be held in addition to the regular class reunions. Every effort has been made to secure the names of those eligible for the degree, and a lengthy list has been printed, but it is requested that if any names have been omitted the faculty will be notified.
