Through his attorneys, Jake Newell and Eugene A. Roberts, W. A. Newell, administrator of A. H. Hatchett, has instituted damage suit against the Southern railway company, et al., because of the killing of A. H. Hatchett by the defendant company. The bill of complaint alleges that on June 7, 1910, Hatchett was engaged as foreman of a force of hands on the Southern's tracks at Marion and while in the discharge of his duties an engine in charge of Engineer Arthur Enloe backed upon him and that he caught hold of the coupler and was dragged about fifty feet before he was jerked from the car and crushed to death by the engine passing over his body. It is alleged that the engine was running only about three miles an hour, and had the engineer and conductor been watchful and diligent the accident would not have occurred.
