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## GOLDSBORO-ASHEVILLE TRAIN TO WAYNESVILLE

June 12 Line Will Be Extended Without Damaging Schedule

RALEIGH, N. C., June 3.—As a result of a special trip by Corporation Commissioner W. T. Lee to Washington to confer with the Southern railway authorities about the matter, the Southern announces that will, beginning June 12, extend the run of its Goldsboro-Asheville train to Waynesville without material changes on the present schedule except the train will run one hour later on the eastbound trip. This will maintain the connections with Wilmington-Goldsboro trains as at present.
