Official Thermometers Showed 98 in Shade Yesterday With Much Humidity

ALSO VERY HOT IN OTHER LOCALITIES

July Ushered in as June Was With Previous Records Shattered Everywhere

WASHINGTON, July 2.—With down town thermometers registering 107 degrees, the weather record for the morning was increased by the official temperature was 98 and the weather was suffering increased by the humidity. No immediate relief it was said in sight.

PALESTINE TO BE REFUGE OF JEWS IF PLAN CARRIES

Federation of American Zionists to Buy 100,000 Acres There Annually

RESIDENTIAL SUBURB ALREADY ESTABLISHED

"Liberty Embodied in American Constitution Gives Scope for Activity"

TANNERSVILLE, N. Y., July 2.—To buy one hundred thousand acres of land annually in Palestine in order to establish colonies of Jews was the principal proposition of a practical nature placed before the fourteenth annual convention of the Federation of American Zionists at its session today.

Those who are in a position to compare Jewish conditions in other lands are convinced that America offers exceptional opportunities for the development of Zionism. In no other country are there so many Jews which combine the genuine customs and the intense love of Zion so characteristic of the Jews of the East, with the freedom of action and the economic prosperity which are found among the Jews of the West.

MAN WHO WASTED MANY RTUNES IS TO SPID NO MORE

"Duke of Gloucester" Dies in Belfast, Ireland, According to Telegram

ALWAYS BERAL WITH HIS MONEY

Accustomed to Making Loans of \$10,000 Without Making Memorandum

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., July 2.—Wm. J. Thompson, familiarly known as the "Duke of Gloucester," who owned the Gloucester race track when race was permitted in South Jersey and who was the most influential democratic politician in that section of the state, died today in Belfast, Ireland, according to a cablegram received by his son, John Thompson. He was 63 years of age.

Always liberal with his money, it was noted at the recent bankruptcy hearing that Thompson was accustomed to make loans of \$10,000 without making any memoranda whatever. When he departed less than two weeks ago for Ireland, he declared that the only money of his own he was taking with him was \$5 cents, same amount which he possessed when he first came to this country, he said, were paying the expenses of his trip.

DISPERSED WHEN ASSURED OF PAY

JULEZ, Mex., July 2.—Former insurance soldiers, numbering about 100, who were assured of pay by Gen. Blain to purchase supplies for themselves and their horses, tonight dispersed when assured by Blanco that they would be paid on Monday. The misunderstanding arose when the price of paying the men out of customs receipts was discontinued on instructions from Mexico City.

RAILROAD DETECTIVES CLAIM THEY KNOW WHO PERPETRATED HOLD-UP

Assert That Arrests Will Soon Be Made of Band of Desperadoes NO THEORIZING

ERIE, Pa., July 2.—The railroad detectives working on the train hold-up of Friday night declared today that they knew for whom they were searching and that there is an end to all theorizing as to the identity of the desperadoes. Chief Verne, of the Pennsylvania detective force, who is in charge of the men at work on the case, says that the bandits are not far away from the scene of their crime and that last night they slipped through the hands of the officers.

Waiting for the Verdict



MOST OF LEADERS EXPECT AND HOPE FOR ADJOURNMENT BY AUGUST 1

Although Much Remains to be Done and Many Long Speeches to be Made—LaFollette Will Doubtless Offer Several Amendments—Simmons, of North Carolina Among Those Who Are Yet to be Heard

WASHINGTON, July 2.—Indications are growing that congress may conclude its extra session earlier than has been generally expected. Many senators, together with Representative Underwood and other democratic leaders are figuring on the first week of August as a possible adjournment time. The situation, however, is not sufficiently clear to warrant a positive prediction.

Neither the senate nor the house will be in session until next Wednesday. The senate special committee to investigate the election of Senator Lorimer will resume hearings here July 13, and the House "sugar trust" investigating committee July 10. The House "steel trust" investigating committee will continue its hearings very soon.

The committee of the state department expenditures expects to present the house positively this week its report recommending the dismissal of General W. H. Michael at Columbus, Ga., and the resignation of James M. McMillan, of the state department, because of their connection with the Justice Day voucher and the \$1,600 unaccounted for therewith.

DIPLOMATISTS DO NOT KNOW WHAT TO THINK OF ACTION

Germany's Sending Warship to Southern Morocco Causes Profound Surprise

UNOFFICIAL REPLY TO BE MADE TUESDAY

Method Chosen by Imperial Government May Seem Strange to France

PARIS, July 2.—The sensation caused by Germany's action in sending a warship to Agadir showed no signs of abatement today and diplomatic circles are said to be in a state of profound ferment.

Public opinion, as viewed by the French newspapers does not appear to be alarmed. The reply of Foreign Minister De Selves to Ambassador Von Schoen, as reported by the Temps, is generally regarded as a diplomatic reply to the sentiments of the French public.

WANTS HER SHARE

BERLIN, July 2.—Germany in sending the gunboat Panther to Agadir and making a claim in Southern Morocco in anticipation of the possible partition of the country, according to the general interpretation of the German press will take its share in the province of Sen with its rich copper and mineral deposits, its great agricultural possibilities and its equable climate in which whites can live and work unless France and Spain will withdraw from the present adventure and really respect the integrity of Morocco.
