THESE ARE BUSY DAYS FOR "REVENOO" MEN

Nineteen illicit stills reported to have been wiped out in Old Virginia—One in Madison County.

Revenue Agent R. B. Sams is in receipt of the report of the seizure of unusually large number of illicit distilleries within the last few days. Nineteen seizures were made in Virginia during the last few days, seventeen of these being in one county and seized by one posse. The officers were out only four days in Franklin county when this record was made. A large number of seizures had already been reported from Franklin county during the last few months. Special Employee Weaver and Deputy Collector Hendricks headed the posse.

Two seizures in Madison and Rappahannock counties were reported by Deputy Collector Wood and Gauger Dean. Deputy Collectors Haynes Bandy and Landreth report one seizure in Wilkes county, North Carolina.
