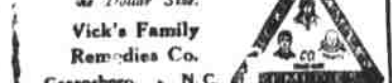

PROBATION OFFICER TO TAKE CHARGE OF BOYS

Number of Them Were Just a Little "Too Gay" on Halloween—Must Pay Costs.

The session of police court yesterday was for the greater part a juvenile one, the defendants being Halloween celebrators, who turned their hands to the rough handling of personal property.

Herman Owens, Bascombe James, Jesse Sprouse, Fred Stewart, Vernon Stewart, Clayton Fox, Wiley Owens and Wilbur Bryson, ranging in age from ten to seventeen years, were the defendants, being charged with the malicious destruction of a wagon belonging to J. F. Forster and a carriage owned by Zeke Gibson.

Fred Stewart, the youngest Halloween celebrator in the list of defendants, was found not guilty. Herman Owens was found guilty but the costs were remitted and he as well as the others were delivered into the custody of Probation Officer Gray Gorham, the latter defendants being required to raise the costs.

It was in evidence that the boys on Halloween night played somewhat roughly with the vehicles above mentioned, as a result of which both were practically demolished. Mr. Forster also said that a long clothes line of his, which was hung out on Tuesday night, was broken and the clothes badly damaged. Some of them, he said, fell into the creek and were washed away.

Judge Adams gave the boys some good advice. He advised them that the proper thing to do would be to see the losers of the property and make good all damages and that if they did this and should be so unfortunate as to be called up to appear in court again, the court would take into consideration their payment for the destroyed property and would be lighter on them.

Heretofore, the lessons of the previous Sundays have been discussed, but several requests have been received that the lesson for the Sunday in advance be studied and for this reason it has been decided to adopt this plan. This will undoubtedly increase the interest in the class and will probably be of great interest to those persons of the city who have classes at Sunday schools.

The growth of these meetings has been remarkable. At last week's class over sixty men were present and the majority of them were young men. The management of the association is gratified with the interest which is being shown in this department of the work.
