About three hundred miles of railroads are being built in the Pyrenees. These railroads are to be operated by electricity, which will be furnished from water power stations in the mountains. Power will be supplied at a voltage of 55,000, which will be stepped down to twelve thousand volts for the trolley wires. The locomotives will be provided with transformers for further reduction to 225 volts.
