THANKSGIVING SPIRIT ABROAD IN THE LAND

YESTERDAY'S WAS IDEAL HOLIDAY WEATHER.

Various Lines of Entertainment Sought and Few There Were Who Failed to Have Good Time.

The Thanksgiving spirit was abroad in the land yesterday, the holiday having been generally observed here. In spite of the fact that the day was very cold, pleasure seekers were not dismayed and managed to enjoy the day to the fullest extent.

Practically all of the city merchants closed their doors and allowed their employes a holiday and the majority of the offices of the professional men remained closed throughout the day. The employes of the various firms spent the holiday in many ways and retired last night thankful for the opportunity which they had had to spend the day as they thought best.

In most of the churches, special services were held and exceedingly good music was arranged by the choirs of the city's many houses of worship.

There were various forms of amusement for those who desired to spend the day pursuing game pleasure. Many huntmen spent the day in the fields and woods and turned the holiday into one of brief for many families of quail and other game. Those who remained in the city and who are not fond of cold weather did not bestir themselves a great deal during the day, having been content to sit near the fire or radiator and read or talk. When they went out of doors they made it a point to reach their destination by the nearest route from the starting point.

It is said that Asheville streets were traversed by fewer automobiles yesterday than during any day for many years. This was probably due to the fact that automobiles cared little to joy ride during the day and few people had business that could be attended to on the national holiday.

The competitive shoot at the new rifle range drew a large number of persons interested in using the pistols, to that place and "The Girl of the Golden West" yesterday afternoon drew a number. No small army of football enthusiasts saw Bingham spank the Marines severely at the Riverside gridiron and various thrills caused the streets to be pretty well filled last evening.

The soda fountains of the city enjoyed a good business during the day, although not much shaved ice was used in their concoctions. Those with a thirst to quench as a rule chose something hot and were exhilarated with bouillions, hot chocolates, soups and other warm fountain drinks. During the afternoon, many housewives bound turkey feathers into slushers and small would be Indians wore a wig of turkey feathers. The turkey family had absolutely nothing to be thankful for yesterday. Cranberries were destroyed in great numbers and mince pie was a favorite. The hotels and cafes of the city served special Thanksgiving dinners and luncheons and many Ashevilleans dined at their favorite eating place in order that the servants might enjoy the day.

Altogether, the day was a pleasant one for those blessed with a goodly portion of the world's goods and the unfortunate were not forgotten by the Associated Charities and other institutions, and no small number of individuals were generous with their gifts to the deserving poor.

GOOD SCORES MADE AT THE RIFLE RANGE

Match Between Militia and Police-men Failed to Materialize, Latter Not Showing Up.

The shooting match between the team of the organized militia and the Asheville police force which was to have been pulled off yesterday at the new rifle range on the Way property in Beavertown, did not materialize as was anticipated, the patrolmen having failed to get out in sufficient numbers to compose a team. However, the militia team did some excellent work and a number of citizens who went out to see the match reported the police force.

Shooting on the fifteen yard line five shots in ten seconds, the following scores were made by the soldiers, the figures indicating the number of perfect shots out of a possible twenty-five, which is regarded as perfect: Young, 18, 17; Bard, 21, 25; Brown, 24, 24; Koon, 20, 22; Kesterson, 21, 20; Riggsbee, 20, 18; McCandless, 22, 20. On the twenty-five yard line shooting five times in ten seconds, the scores were as follows: Young 19; Bard, 21; Brown, 48; Koon, 18; Kesterson, 13; Riggsbee, 0; McCandless, 22. On the same line shooting the same number of shots in twenty seconds, out of a possible twenty-five, the following scores were made: Young, 20; Bard, 25; Brown, 24; Koon, 11; Kesterson, 23; Riggsbee, 16; McCandless, 21. From the fifty yard line, shooting five shots in thirty seconds, the figures look like this: Young, 18; Bard, 22; Brown, 21; Koon, 20; Kesterson 18; Riggsbee, 0; McCandless, 13.
