TWINS OVERCOME HEALTHY LEAD AND WIN FROM MOUNTAINEERS

Waymack Weakens and Watson Gives Up Triple With Two Men on Bases—Greensboro and Raleigh Are Winners.

WINSTON-SALEM, May 31.—(Special.)—Asheville took an early lead in today's game with the Twins and went at a fast rate of speed until the fourth, when Waymack weakened, and Watson, who succeeded him in the pit, was pounded for a triple.

With two men on bases in the eighth, Barbara sent out one that looked good for a double, but Clapp ran against the fence for it and drew it from the atmosphere with one hand, making the third out. Barbara was the victim of another pretty piece of work on the part of the Twins in the third, when he was caught at the plate, on a ball relayed by two players.

The Mountaineers scored two runs in the first inning, the tallies coming in this way: Corbett doubled and went home when O'Halloran made a wild throw, Noolin being safe at first. Frye singled to left field and Noolin crossed the rubber. In the second the visitors added another tally to their collection, when Millman drew a base on balls and was sacrificed to second. He scored when Corbett singled to center field. In the fourth Waymack singled to center field and went to second on Clapp's error. He scored when Corbett doubled.

Winston-Salem scored two in the fourth. Gates singled to center field and went to second on Noolin's error. Edwards singled, Gates crossing the plate. Edwards was out at second, when Roberts was safe on a fielder's choice. Boyle singled to left field, scoring Roberts. In the fifth O'Halloran singled and Smith drew a base on balls. Waymack was taken out at this stage of the game and there were two men on and no outs, when Watson went in. Gates took the first one that came over, set up a triple and cleaning up the bases. He came home with the winning run, when Clapp lined out a sacrifice fly to left field.
