MOUNTAINEERS LOSE TO MACK'S CAPITALS

NOT A TOURIST GOT AS FAR AS THIRD.

Jarmon Pitched Excellent Ball, White Local Twirlers Were Weak—Doak Expelled from Park.

RALEIGH, Aug. 22.—(Special)—Playing a listless game, Asheville suffered a shut-out at the hands of the Capitals today, Raleigh scoring four runs, while not a Mountaineer reached third base. The features of the game were Jarmon's pitching and Edward's sensational catch of Frye's fly in the sixth inning. Raleigh's players also distinguished themselves by excellent base running. Raleigh's first run came in the second inning when Whitted singled to left. Cruthers sacrificed and Mack singled to right, Whitted scoring on Citrano's single. In the third inning, Jarman, who was given quite an ovation when he stepped to the plate, opened with a three-bagger, and scored on Edward's single. In the fifth inning Jarman again covered himself with glory by hitting a single to left; O'Keefe struck out and Edwards walked. Neild singled to left, scoring Lidgate and Jarman.

Doak, of the Asheville team, mixed things up with Umpire Miller in the second inning and was put out of the grounds by a policeman. He was replaced in right field by Frye. The game between Asheville and Raleigh was the only one played in the Carolina league, the others being prevented by rain.

WORK ON BUILDING TO START IMMEDIATELY

Addition of Thirty-Two Rooms Will Be Built at the Voon Ruck Sanatorium.

In order that he may be able to care for the increasing number of patients who are applying at his sanatorium for treatment, Dr. Karl von Ruck will immediately start work upon the construction of an addition of thirty-two rooms to the institution. It was announced in a recent issue of The Citizen that he was contemplating such action and that the building is to be constructed without delay was learned last night, when a building permit was granted to Dr. von Ruck for the construction of a sanatorium of thirty-two rooms. The addition to the building will make the sanatorium one of the most modern to be found anywhere. The addition is to be built at an estimated cost of \$17,955 and it is stated that the contract has already been let. The work of making the necessary excavations and laying the foundation will be started immediately, as it is the intention of the management of the sanatorium to have it ready for occupancy by the coming fall. Once started, the work will be rushed as fast as is consistent with good workmanship. The addition will conform in style and appearance to the present sanatorium building, the outer walls being of stone.
