APPLICANTS FOR SMALL OFFICES TO BE EXAMINED

Inspectors Appointed to Examine Men Wanting Offices Less Than \$100.

(By George H. Manning). WASHINGTON, Sept. 2.—Inspectors have been detailed by the postoffice department to examine applicants for all postoffices in North Carolina having a salary of less than \$100 a year.

The applicants for this class of offices are not required to take competitive examinations as are those receiving salaries between \$100 and \$1,000 a year, which have lately been placed under the civil service.

The inspectors will give notice through the county papers as to where they will be at certain times to make inquiry regarding those desirous of caring for Uncle Sam's smallest class of postoffices. Personal fitness will be a material consideration and will also be the facilities the applicant can offer for handling the business of the office.

The inspectors will make their reports to the department, giving the ratings of the different applicants with regard to fitness and facilities offered, and in most cases the department will call upon the congressman representing that district to secure the benefit of any knowledge he may have regarding the desirability of any of the candidates.
