

Y. M. C. A MEETING FOR MEN AND WOMEN

Address, "Building the Home Nest," To Be Delivered by Dr. Calvin B. Waller at 4 O'clock.

A departure will be made from the usual custom at the Y. M. C. A. next Sunday afternoon when a mass meeting for men and women will be held instead of the regular Sunday afternoon meeting for men. Dr. Calvin B. Waller, pastor of the First Baptist church, has been secured to deliver the address and it is expected that the association auditorium will be packed to its capacity. Arrangements are being made to seat 100 more people than usual, extra chairs being placed in the rear of the hall. The subject of Dr. Waller's address will be "Building the Home Nest," or a discussion of home life. The meeting will begin at 4 o'clock. An unusually good musical program has been arranged for the occasion. The Y. M. C. A. orchestra augmented by several additional pieces under the direction of W. E. Collins will render several selections and a male quartette composed of A. I. Ruby, A. D. Stoner, W. E. Collins and Dr. L. B. McBrayer will sing. This is regarded as one of the best male quartettes in the city and the management of the association is congratulating itself on securing it for the Sunday service.

The regular Sunday afternoon branch meetings conducted under the auspices of the association at the Riverside club house and the railroad Y. M. C. A. hall near the Southern passenger station will be held at the usual hour and good speakers have been secured to deliver the addresses.

MOGULS OF LEAGUE HAVE BEEN CHOSEN

Amateur Baseball Commission Formed to Head the League—Schedule To Be Arranged.

Presidents of the Y. M. C. A. baseball leagues were appointed yesterday morning by the management of the association as follows: Roy Jordan, president of the class A. league; Mark Lance, president of the class B. league; Eugene Coston, president of the class C. league; Dewey Cline, president of the class D. league. As soon as the president of the boys' governing board is elected tonight the amateur commission of the Y. M. C. A. leagues will be formed. It will be composed of the presidents of the four leagues, the physical director and the general secretary of the association and the president of the governing board.

This commission is at the head of the league and is the court of last appeal in all cases of dispute. The commission has control of the league makes out the schedule of games to be played and passes on and awards all players entering the league after the first of the season. It looks to the purchasing of all balls and other necessities and the securing of umpires for the games. As soon as all of the captains in all of the leagues have finished choosing their men the commission will meet and arrange the schedule. It has already been arranged to have the first games April 3.

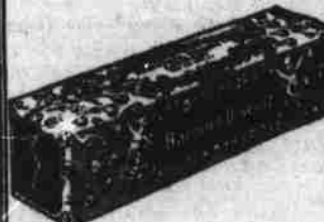

MANY ASSAULT CASES BEFORE POLICE COURT

Seventeen of This Kind Out of Forty-Four Called for Hearing—Defendant Fined for Insults.

Examples of fighting spirit were considerably in evidence at the session of the police court yesterday morning when out of forty-four cases called for hearing seventeen defendants were charged with assault. Most of these were arrested late Saturday night or early Sunday morning although Sunday night and Monday-morning were not altogether free from disturbances of this character. Most of the defendants in cases of this kind were the recipients of light fines although a few of the cases were continued.

An unusually heavy docket was before the court yesterday. Seven of the cases called were against alleged violators of the traffic ordinance, seven were against defendants charged with drunkenness and ten cases of a disorderly nature were heard. The majority of the defendants were fined, but some escaped upon the payment of the costs while a few were adjudged not guilty.

The session was featured by the hearing of the cases of Rex Satterfield, charged with disorderly conduct in two cases. He was arrested Friday on a charge of this kind when he is alleged to have used insulting and offensive language to C. W. Hall, star witness for the state at the session of the Superior court when several liquor cases were tried. He was called before the police court Saturday morning but the case was continued to yesterday morning when he was tried on the second charge. A fine of \$25 and costs was assessed for the first offense and \$50 and costs was the amount assessed for the second.

Joe Burnett, who was arrested Sunday afternoon on a charge of larceny of a watch and chain, a knife, a pair of gold cuff links and a ring from the office of Dr. C. D. W. Colby, waived examination when arraigned before the court and was bound to the next criminal term of the Buncombe county Superior court. Lillian Snyder was sentenced to serve a term of ten days in the Buncombe county jail on a charge of vagrancy. She pleaded guilty to the charge and submitted her case to the mercy of the court.

WARRANT IS ISSUED FOR THE ARREST OF CHAPMAN

Wanted in Connection With Killing of Sid Chapman, in Georgia.

CALHOUN, Ga., March 23.—A warrant was issued today for the arrest of Charles Chapman in connection with the killing of Mrs. Chapman's uncle, Sid Chapman near this place early Saturday. The dead man's sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Starnes, on whose doorstep the body was found Saturday morning and her daughter, Mrs. Chapman, already are under arrest on suspicion.

Charles Chapman, who with Mrs. Chapman, lived at the Starnes home, was said today to be in Wildwood, Ga., and officers were sent there to arrest him. According to Mrs. Chapman and Mrs. Starnes, both of whom were at Mrs. Starnes' house during Friday night, and both of whom professed ignorance of the killing, Charles Chapman has been absent from this locality for several weeks.

Authorities today continued their questioning of the two women held here, and made a thorough search of the house before which the young farmer's body was found. It was stated that Mrs. Starnes and Mrs. Chapman would not be arraigned for preliminary hearing until after Chapman's arrest.

IRONTON TO VOTE

IRONTON, O., March 23.—The city charter which is to be adopted or rejected by the voters of Ironton at the special election tomorrow embodies the most advanced ideas of municipal government ever proposed for any city in Ohio. It provides for the direction of all municipal affairs by five commissioners with the aid of a city manager. The five commissioners are to choose one of their number as mayor and they also will have the power to appoint the city auditor, city solicitor and city treasurer. The city manager will have the appointment of the heads of all departments and will be in charge of all the business now transacted by the executive branch of the city government.
