MARKET NEWS

COTTON REVIEW.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Quite a reactionary sentiment developed in the local cotton market immediately after the Easter holidays. It was argued that during a full month of active covering the short interest must have been much reduced, and that a scattering long interest had accumulated on the advance.

Trading, however, was less active on the rally toward the end of the week and talk around the ring suggested a more or less unsettled sentiment with many traders expressing determination to operate conservatively pending fresh developments in the spot situation or a nearer view of the new crop start.

On the other hand, the inspection bureau is still reported to be rejecting a large proportion of the cotton received here; Manchester reports have indicated continued activity at that point; the statistical position has strengthened owing to continued full spindles takings; the census report showed domestic mill consumption for the month of March well up to the recent high average and southern advices have indicated little or no change in the interior spot market.

CLEWS' REVIEW.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Another week of disappointment has come to those who have been hoping for better things in the business world. The development of affairs in Mexico has been a source of more or less financial distrust. The patient attitude of the administration and its repeated pledge to make no conquest in that territory, of course afforded some assurance, but the dispatch of battleships and other armed forces to maintain our rights and dignity strongly suggested intervention and the unknown consequences of such a policy.

Legislation has been, and still is, being pushed at breakneck speed; and now that the agony attending the passage into law of the tariff and currency bills has been borne patiently it is not about time that the long-suffering business people throughout the entire country be permitted to have a little breathing spell so that they can start anew their activities, the essential of which, to meet with success, is the exercise of good judgment, which calls into requisition courage and initiative?

Diminished domestic buying weakened the price of copper. There was fresh fears of delay in the freight rates case and of possible unfavorable action. New steps in trust legislation dissipated the impression that the matter was to lapse at this session of congress.

The New York city bond sale registered substantial improvement in investment demand. Railroad earnings while still falling off, began to compare favorably owing to last year's flood damages and to retrenchment. Reports of insect damage gave warning of possible modification of favorable crop prospects.

DUN'S REVIEW.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Adverse weather conditions accentuate the prevailing quietness in trade. Evidences of improvement are not absent, yet progress is checked by the backward spring.

The supply of commercial paper continues light, notwithstanding the attractive terms offered by financial institutions. Confidence in the future however, is maintained, largely because of the splendid agricultural outlook.

Winter wheat is in such shape that even last year's banner yield probably will be surpassed. Everything points to an increased cotton acreage, while other leading crops are starting well. Speculative influences have imparted some firmness to prices of farm staples, but in a broad sense, commodities are still tending downward.

Failures this week numbered 315 against 295 last year and 89 in Canada compared with 87.

Financial operations must still be conducted with caution. A very considerable decline has taken place during the past few weeks and prices are now almost at the level preceding the January rise. Possibly in view of the favorable conditions just referred to, a recovery may come sooner than at present anticipated but no permanent improvement can be expected until there is a cessation of injurious political activities and business is allowed to have a much needed rest from such uncertainties.

DRY GOODS REVIEW.

NEW YORK, April 19.—Trade in cotton goods for late delivery continues along conservative lines. Spot business is steady but is made up largely of small lots. Express shipments and telegraphic orders are common from the largest houses. Fall dating has been granted on staple prints and jobbers are placing orders moderately. Bleached cottons of the better grades continue firm, the low grades being slightly easier. One or two leading lines of staple ginghams that were reduced to clean up stocks have now been restored to the old prices.

Export trade is quiet and export shipments are now beginning to decline compared with a year ago. Fancy wash goods business is fair but not up to the usual volume at this period of the year. The tendency toward printed wash fabrics was well maintained. Duck markets are quiet and yarns are easy and inclined to dullness. Stocks are generally well in hand and many of the large mills are selling their product as it comes from the looms.

Printers are very busy, bleachers are moderately well employed, and many of the finishers are getting a good spot and nearby trade. Prices are as follows: Print cloths, 28 inch, 64x64, 3/4c; 64x64, 2 7-16c; 38 1/2 inch 64x64, 5/8c and 5/16c; brown sheetings, southern standards, 8c; denims, 9 ounce, 14c; tickings, 8 ounce, 12 1/2c; standard prints, 5 1/4c; standard staple ginghams, 6 1/2c; dress ginghams, 9 1/4c.

FINANCIAL REVIEW.

Conditions in the steel trade offered no hope of immediate relief. Continuation of outgo in excess of new orders cut down further the margins of future business.

Unfavorable estimates of United States Steel's earnings for the first quarter were coupled with predictions of a worse showing for the second quarter.
