DUPONT COMPANY BREAKS RECORDS

WILMINGTON, Del., Feb. 13.—All records, both as to volume of business and net earnings, were broken by E. I. DuPont de Nemours and company, last year, according to the annual report of the company made public last night. Gross receipts for the year aggregated \$318,845,684, an increase of 1130 per cent. as compared with the average sales for 1913 and 1914, which amounted to \$25,957,427. Net earnings in 1916 were \$32,107,632 and in addition to payment of six per cent. in dividends was distributed to the common stockholders during the year.

Since October, 1914, about \$60,000,000 has been expended in the construction of new plants to fill "war orders." In the report, Pierre S. DuPont,

president of the company, says: "The company is not waiting for the end of the war, but is anticipating it with a view to turning the greatly expanded munition plants over to productive commercial uses as soon as the present abnormal demand for its products ceases. Plans have been perfected to cope with any financial conditions that may develop after the war."

JAMES H. POSEY DIES AT MISSION HOSPITAL

Veteran of Union Army Succumbs to Recent Injuries, at the Age of Eighty-Four Years.

"Captain" James H. Posey, a well-known Asheville character, died last night at 6:15 o'clock at the Mission hospital. Captain Posey was eighty-four years old. The old man was struck by a wagon on the corner of Patton and South Lexington avenues more than a month ago and was taken to the Mission hospital, which he was never able to leave.

Captain Posey was a widower and while it is stated that he has several children in Virginia and St. Louis, no one in Asheville knows much of his history. He came here several years ago for his health, and became known by his faith in olive oil, which he used faithfully as a medicine for many years.

The old man was quite hale for one of his age and on every clear day, the temperature permitting, he occupied a chair in front of the fire station. He was a veteran of the Union army in the war between the states. He lived in a room in the Library building.

The deceased was a devout Christian and was a member of the First Baptist church. He was a regular attendant at the weekly men's meetings of the Y. M. C. A., not missing a meeting. Captain Posey, several years ago, had printed thousands of cards bearing a verse beginning, "Do Not Swear," and with a scriptural quotation at the bottom. He distributed large numbers of these cards at his own expense.

Captain Posey's body is now at a local undertaking establishment, awaiting word from relatives in the north as to its disposition.
