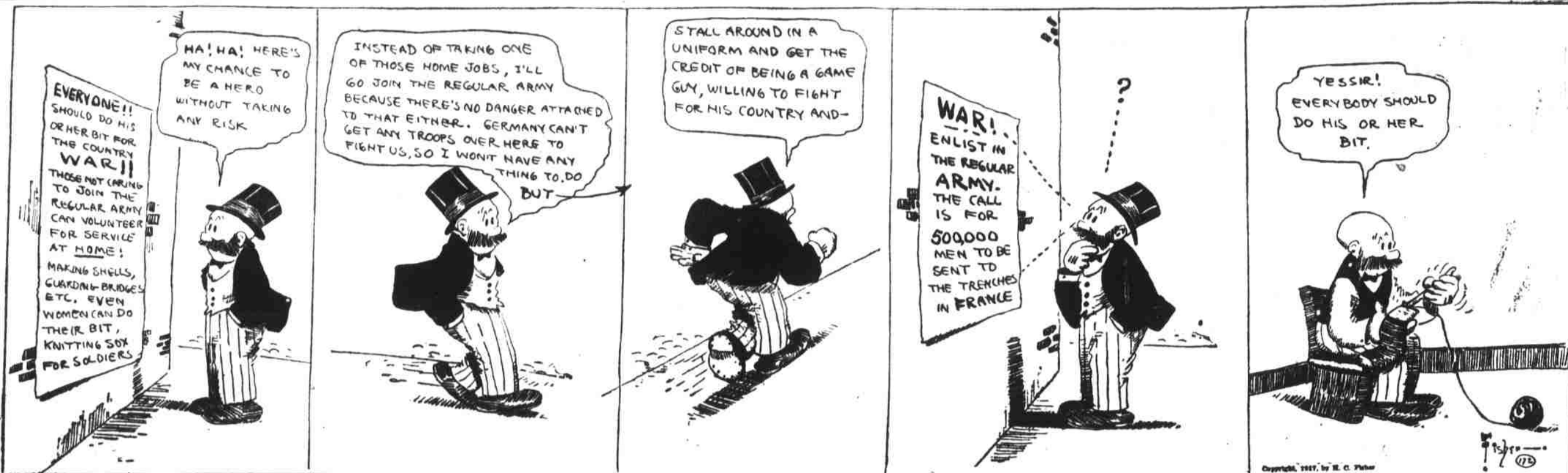

ORGANIZING SECOND AT THE "MOVIES" MILITARY COMPANY AT THE PRINCESS.

Hendersonville Will Do Its Bit In War With Germany—Telegram Sent to President.

HENDERSONVILLE, April 6.—Hendersonville is organizing a second military company this week. Cecil Pace, who has seen four years service in the army and has had seven years training in all, will have charge of the new company. Mr. Pace has already received orders from Washington to begin enlistments as soon as possible.

Hendersonville citizens in every walk of life stand in hearty endorsement of President Wilson and in the actions of congress of the past week and in anticipation of the final act last night, a telegram was sent to the president last Monday urging the president and congress to wage determined war. The telegram as sent, read as follows: "As citizens of the United States we are shocked and horrified at the deliberate and savage murder of American men, women and children by Germany, and we are intensely indignant over the accumulation of insult and humiliation heaped upon our country. We urge you and congress to wage determined war upon that nation until peace with victory over German barbarism is accomplished." This message was signed by twenty-eight of the leading citizens of the town, including all the professions, and different lines of business, prominent private citizens and also the Historian of the local Daughters of the Confederacy.

Further to show the patriotic feeling rife among our people, a grand mass meeting of town and county will be held in the court house one night at the first of next week. Circulars and telephone messages will be sent throughout the county urging people to attend en masse. The Hendersonville Light Infantry will attend in a body, patriotic music will be furnished, prominent speakers will be heard, and a most enthusiastic demonstration is expected.
