WAITE DECLARED SANE.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 14.—Dr. Arthur Warren Waite, the young New York dentist, under sentence to die next week for the murder of his father-in-law, John Peck, of Grand Rapids, Mich., has been declared sane by a commission of alienists appointed by Governor Whitman. It was announced today. The alienists found that Dr. Waite was sane both at the time the crime was committed in March, 1916, and on May 14, 1917, when the examination was made. The result of the report means that the death sentence must be carried out, unless legal steps intervene or Governor Whitman exercises executive clemency. Besides confessing that he poisoned his father-in-law, Waite also admitted he had poisoned his mother-in-law, Mrs. Peck, and contemplated killing his wife, in order that he might obtain her share of the Peck estate.

Farm and Fireside tells us that what is thought to be the largest check ever paid for a single can of cream in southwest Washington was lately received by James N. Hibbard, a dairyman and rancher, from a creamery in Clarke county. He shipped the concern a 10-gallon can of cream last month and received \$16.50 for it. "The can contained 37 1-4 pounds of butterfat which netted the dairyman 44 cents a pound. The cream had the unusually high test of 48 per cent.
