The following is from the Durham paper: "One of the most beautiful and brilliant weddings in the history of Durham was that of Miss Mattie McCullen Toms and Mr. John Adams Buchanan, solemnized at Memorial Methodist church at 8:30 o'clock Saturday evening. "The church, thronged with guests, was a scene of unusual beauty, being most artistically decorated in white and green. "Dainty little flower girls, Margaret Louise Carr and Virginia Fowlers, preceded the bride party, coming separately down the right and left aisle. They wore white net frocks with short pink veils and carried small leghorn hats filled with pink roses and blue ragged robins. "The groomsmen entered two at a time, coming down the aisle as follows: At the right, Clinton Toms and La P. McLendon, Alex Worth and Sam Angier; at the left, Edgar Toms and Fuller Glass, Arthur Harris and Ernest Howard, of Oxford. "The bridesmaids were becomingly gowned in white lace net, trimmed in bands of pale blue messaline touched with pink, with scarfs of pink and blue tulle. They carried leghorn hats filled with Dorothy Perkins roses and ragged robins, tied from the left arm with pink and blue tulle.
