REGISTER NOW UNDER ARSENAL VOTERS' LAW.

Editor The Citizen: Please permit me through your pages to call the attention of your readers to the law enacted at the last session of the general assembly which permits absent electors to vote.

Soldiers in the national guard all men who are called to service in the national guard, and who are absent from their homes during the term of their primary election, should register at the general election.
