

WARM FIGHT OVER WAR REVENUE BILL IS DUE IN SENATE

Material Amendment of Measure Is Regarded as Certain.

STAMP SECTION IS PASSED TO MONDAY

Simmons Plans for Vote on War Profit and Other Sections.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 25.—Preparations made today by senate leaders for next week's discussion of the war tax bill present one of the most determined and spectacular struggles of the war session.

The bill was not taken up today, the senate recessing after a brief session until Monday for conferences of those prominent in the fight for and against increasing the tax levies.

Stamp Section Goes Over. Consideration of the postage tax sections, scheduled for today, went over until Wednesday.

The war profits section of the bill, Senator Simmons stated tonight, is to follow and on Monday or soon thereafter he plans a determined effort to have a definite date fixed for a vote on profits and the entire bill.

A group of senators prominent in the fight to place higher tax rates on war profits, including Johnson of California, La Follette, Borah, Kenyon, and others conferred today and decided to make a determined effort along that line.

While the high tax rates were in session, finance committee leaders also conferred toward uniting support for the majority draft toward the war profit section.

Meetings of the entire finance committee and also the leaders in the campaign to increase the tax levies are set for Monday before the senate convenes.

Finance committee leaders conceived planned to line up the senate membership as far as possible to prevent any drastic increase and also to ward expediting action on the bill.

AMERICANS FLY DAILY. SOMEWHERE ON THE FRENCH FRONT (Thursday), Aug. 25.—(By The Associated Press)—(Delayed)—All the American aviators in the Lafayette Flying Corps have been on the wing every day since last Sunday.

The increased size of the two offerings over the offerings made in advance of the first Liberty bond issue is regarded as presaging a larger offering of Liberty bonds in the second issue than the first.
