Senator Smoot and others have indicated that they will not fight certain features of the report, but not believed they will send it back to conference. So it is expected that the report will be adopted in its present form.

MAYOR MITCHELL TO RUN FOR MAYOR AS FUSION CANDIDATE

Defeated for Republican Nomination Will Make Race as an Independent.

"AMERICANISM" TO BE SOLE PLATFORM

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—Mayor John Purroy Mitchell, democrat, defeated in the republican primaries for re-nomination, announced publicly from the steps of the city hall today that he would run as the fusion candidate on a issue of straight Americanism.

E. McGuffee, vice-president of the state federation of labor, and heard read a letter of approval from William Howard Taft and a telegram of approval from Charles Edward Russell.

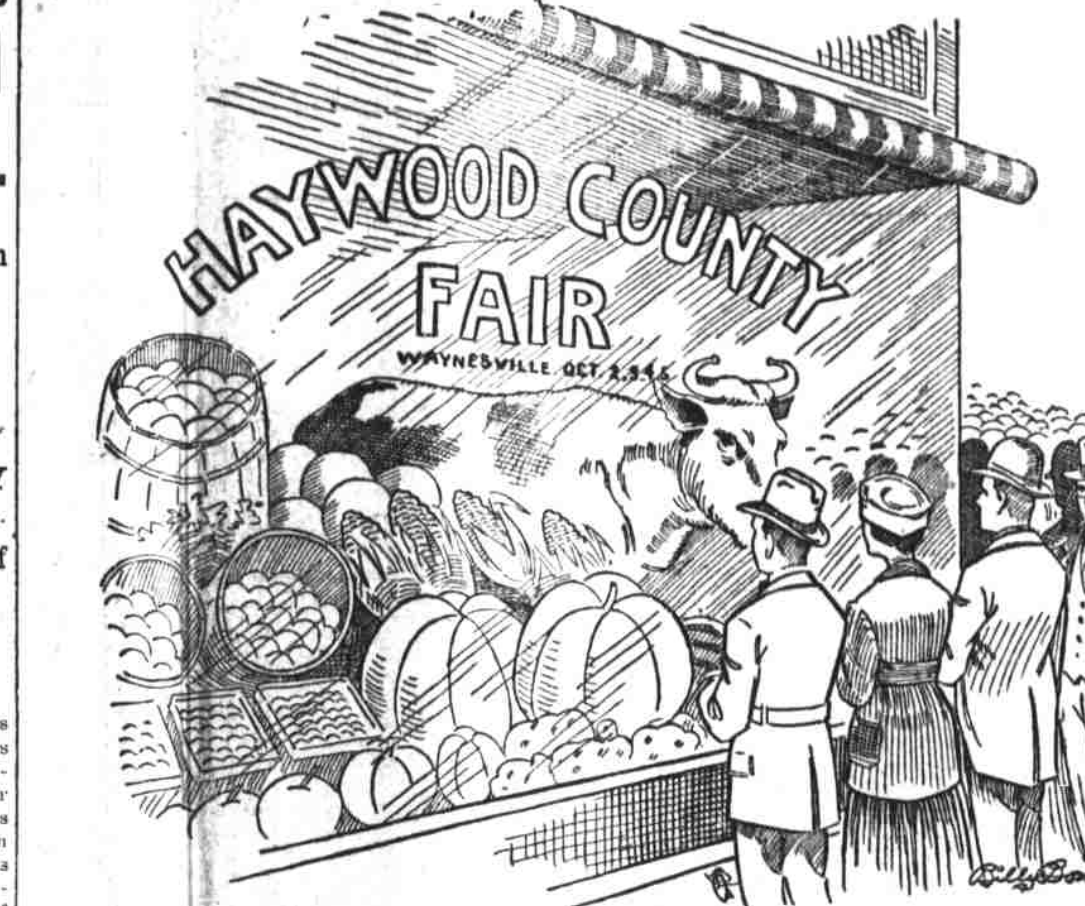

GREAT NATIONAL DRIVE FOR THE SECOND LIBERTY LOAN STARTS OUT WITH EVERY INDICATION OF TRIUMPHANT SUCCESS

Telegraphic Report to the Treasury From Every Section Tells of Tremendous Enthusiasm on Part of Tens of Thousands of Workers—Secretary McAdoo Opens His Campaign for the Loan at Cleveland—Speaker Gets One.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 1.—The great Liberty loan drive started today throughout the country with a rush. Telegraphic reports to the treasury department from every section indicate tremendous enthusiasm on the part of tens of thousands of workers and a fair first day volume of subscription toward the \$3,000,000,000 minimum which has been set as the goal for the four weeks campaign.

Flags were seen, whistles were blown, acres of billboards blossomed into red, white and blue posters and thousands of workers started the campaign with enthusiasm from New England to California. Everywhere, from postoffice banks and store windows, railway stations, street cars and scores of other public places, Liberty posters with arched slogans were posted up and workers began the task of finding buyers.

Enthusiasm Everywhere. Towns and cities from coast-to-coast welcomed the beginning of the campaign with distinctive demonstrations. Here in the capital, street cars were stopped for two minutes at noon and automobile horns and sirens let loose a bedlam of noise as the field force began its work.

McAdoo's Plea. Toledo, O., Oct. 1.—Speaking to several thousand citizens in Memorial hall here tonight in opening the Liberty loan campaign in this district, Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo declared that the failure of a single issue of government bonds would be worse for America than a disaster upon the field of battle.

A flying squadron of nearly 1,000 soldiers stormed Chicago as the bells were ringing and whistles were blowing. With ten million subscribers as the goal, the average daily subscription list should show 400,000 names. Again, computed on an eight-hour working day basis, fifty thousand men and women would have to subscribe every hour to bring the total up to expectations.

C., at an early date. He already has visited the guard camp at Mineola, reviewing the "rainbow division" and the national army cantonment at Annapolis Junction, Maryland.

"A few days ago I read the following manifesto issued in Berlin by the league of German municipalities: 'If money talks, the president of the United States may learn by October 18, when the subscription lists close, that the echo of the new war fund given by the German people will have drowned out completely the clamor of unending protests which his reply to the pope has given stimulus.'"

Let us meet that challenge by a subscription to our second Liberty loan on the 17th day of October, nine days after the close of the German loan which will make clear to the American people, not alone her brave soldiers upon the field, her invincible navy upon the high seas, her breadth of this land, but as well her industry throughout the length and financial resources, and that she is determined to use them all without stint and regardless of sacrifice to vindicate American rights, outraged too frequently by German infamies.

Buhl, vice president of the Schoenhofen Brewing company, announced the purchase of \$250,000. Miss Ruth Law, aviatrix, sent a special delivery letter from Florida with a order for \$10,000 in bonds and there was a rush of smaller subscriptions that gave assurances that the second issue of war bonds would have an even readier sale in the Chicago federal reserve district than the first.

SILENCE ON THE WESTERN FRONT IS STILL UNBROKEN

Believed That Field Marshal Haig Has Planned Some Big Movement.

HEAVY CANNONADE IN YPRES SECTION

People of England Demand Reprisals on Germans For Recent Air Raids.

The almost complete silence that for four days has surrounded the operations of the British armies in France and Belgium continues. Aside from the announcements in the official reports—and these are meagre to a degree—nothing has been permitted to pass through the censorship which would indicate what Field Marshal Haig has in immediate view.

Along the coast in Belgium and around Ypres extremely heavy reciprocal bombardments are taking place. Nothing is contained in either the British or German communications to show that the troops of either side have left their trenches—even for forays.

MEXICAN CONSUL GENERAL SAYS HIS COUNTRYMEN ARE DRAFTED INTO U. S. SERVICE

Makes Strong Protest and Accuses Exemption Board of Illegal Practices.

ALLEGES FORCE.

NEW YORK, Oct. 1.—More than one hundred Mexicans have been illegally drafted for service in the national army by boards in this city and many subjects of Mexico are being secreted here to prevent their arrest by military authorities, according to Juan T. Burns, Mexican consul general, who tonight declared he would "go to any extreme to protect the rights of Mexicans residing here."

Knowing his official status, members of a local draft board have certified for service Vice-Consul Juan Martinez, the consul general stated. He said he did not know what his country proposed doing through diplomatic channels in reference to the impression of Mexican subjects into service of the United States, but declared he felt obliged to protest against "this arbitrary action committed in a most absurd way."

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
