BIG HAYWOOD COUNTY FAIR OPENS TODAY

EXHIBITS BEST IN HISTORY OF THE COUNTY.

Premiums offered for Practically Every Farm Product.—Racing to Feature Three Days of Fair.

Bigger and better than ever before, with the largest number of exhibits and the highest class amusement features in its history, the Haywood county fair will open at Waynesville this morning. Many Asheville people have made arrangements to attend on the opening day, and motor parties will go over practically every day during the fair. It will continue over Friday, which is the closing day. Racing, which will be featured every day except the opening day, is always a strong drawing card at the fair. None but Western North Carolina horses are entered, and the prizes are small, but the races are just as close and exciting, as a rule, as those run on the grand circuit, albeit the times not quite so fast. Every effort has been made by the Haywood County Stock Raisers and Farmers' association, under whose auspices the fair is held, to make it the best in its history of the county, and every intention is that they have succeeded.

Premiums are offered for the best display of corn, open to the whole state; wheat, plum and mountain sections; oats, whole state; hay, mountain; sweet potatoes, whole state; Irish potatoes, whole state; exhibits of boys' and girls' products; horses, demurettes in cooking; boys' and girls' stock judging contest; canned products, home-made devices, best community exhibit; cattle, sheep, swine, poultry, pantry supplies, cakes, pastries, candies, fruits, candy, canned vegetables, dairy products, ladies' work, dresses, waists, etc.; painting, woodwork, school exhibit, different types of school work and many miscellaneous prizes.

The fourth and last day, Friday, will be Western North Carolina day when the folks from other counties and sections will be expected at the fair. Everybody west of the Blue Ridge mountains is extended an invitation to attend on this day. Among the amusement events already arranged for are a fiddlers' and banjo pickers' contest, which will be open to the world. A prize of \$12 has been offered to the best fiddler and a similar prize to the best banjo picker; and a shooting match, for Western North Carolina marksmen. Three prizes of \$5 each have been offered in this event. A prize of \$12 has been offered to the best between Cante and Waynesville for the championship of Haywood county, each side to have twelve or more men.

Racing will be a feature of Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. Nothing but Western North Carolina horses will be permitted to enter. Prizes aggregating \$8 have been offered for Wednesday; \$8 on Thursday and a like amount on Friday.

CAPTAIN W. D. ROATH WILL BE BURIED HERE

POSTMASTER GUDGER GETS WIRE FROM WIDOW.

Unique Naval Figure Will Be Buried in Full Uniform at Riverside Cemetery, as He Requested.

Funeral arrangements for the late Captain W. D. Roath, who died Saturday night at his home in Woolsey, will be made by Asheville friends some time today. Postmaster Owen Gudger has received a telegram from the widow of the retired naval officer, directing that the body be interred here, as he had requested, and also directing Mr. Gudger to take charge of any personal effects and hold them until a letter can reach here from San Francisco, where Mrs. Roath is now living.

Captain Roath, despite the near approach of death, refused Saturday night to give the least information that could lead to the notification of his wife and daughter, neither of whom he had seen for thirteen years. Information received from Col. Walker Taylor, collector of the port at Wilmington, led to the location of the wife, and Postmaster Gudger, after asking instructions in regard to the disposition of the body.

As one of Captain Roath's last requests was that he be buried at Riverside cemetery, in full naval uniform, with an American flag draped over his casket, these instructions, in view of the message from the widow, will be carried out. The telegram to Mr. Gudger from Mrs. Roath, which reached here last night, was as follows:

"Kindly take charge of Captain W. D. Roath's remains and bury in Asheville. Also take charge of his personal effects and papers." Letter to follow tonight. His WIFE, MRS. W. ROATH.

Captain Roath had been a unique naval figure, a veteran of two wars. He served with distinction during the Civil war, and was in command of a gunboat on the Cuban coast during the Spanish-American war. Despite participation in battle after battle, he was never wounded, and his anecdotes of his escapes were a source of much entertainment to his friends.

He never mentioned his wife and daughter, from whom he had been separated for thirteen years, and refused on his deathbed to furnish any clue to their whereabouts.

The body is at the Noland-Brown undertaking establishment awaiting funeral arrangements, which will be made today.

INDUSTRIAL WORK AT THE COLORED SCHOOLS

All Schools Open With Good Enrollments and Many Are Planning for Additional Month.

J. H. Michael, principal of the Hill street school, and supervisor of the colored schools of the county, announces that all of the colored schools have opened with good enrollments and every indication that each of the schools will experience a successful year.

Much interest is being shown in the industrial work which has been taken up by the schools. One day in the week is being devoted to teaching sewing and chair caning for the girls, and wood working for the boys. Supervisor Michael states that there have been fifty desks installed at the Hill school. These desks were purchased with funds contributed by the Biltmore school. Superintendent of Public Instruction Hipps, and residents of the community.

Many of the colored schools throughout the county are raising funds with which to continue the school term another month. The length of the term in these schools is now from three to seven months, and the pupils and teachers are desirous of adding an extra month, in order that additional training may be secured by the pupils.

A general meeting of the colored school teachers will be held at the Hill street school Saturday afternoon at 3 o'clock, to discuss plans for the year.
