POSTAGE RATES WILL ADVANCE NEXT MONTH

Will Cost Three Cents to Send Letter Out of Asheville Save on Rural Delivery Routes.

Postmaster Gudger has received notices from the postal department that on and after November 3, all letters to persons residing outside the city will have to carry a three cent stamp. This is the first evidence of the new tax laws that have been enacted by the recent session of congress. It is understood that more of them will come later.

The new postal law provides that the first class rate of postage shall be three cents an ounce instead of two cents, the rate now in effect. There is one provision in the law that makes it possible to avoid the three cent rate. This is one which provides for the use of rural delivery routes, from the office from which the rural service extends. By this provision Asheville people and those living on any of the rural routes running from this office will be enabled to receive letters from persons within the city, at the old rate. All others must carry the three cent stamp, or stamps to the value of three cents.

The new postage law specifies that postcards and pamphlets which have heretofore been carried for one cent, must now carry a two cent stamp. The postal department is preparing a new issue of postcards, but in case they are not ready by November 2, it will be necessary to attach an extra one cent stamp to the old cards. Picture postals come under the same classification.

Persons who mail letters or cards after November 2, with only the old stamp attached, will be called upon to pay the extra penny, or the letter will be forwarded to the one to whom it is addressed, marked "postage due," and they will have to pay the extra amount.

DR. A. W. CALLOWAY SIGNALY HONORED

One of Ten Men in United States Invited to Accept Specialist's Post at Army Hospital.

Dr. A. W. Calloway, of this city, has received a letter from Major Seale Harris, member of the surgeon general's staff, asking the Asheville physician if he will consider taking the position of gastroenterologist at one of the ten large government hospitals to be erected in the United States. Dr. Calloway has taken the matter under advisement, and is awaiting further particulars from the surgeon general's department.

Major Harris, in writing to Dr. Calloway, points out that the position is one of particular honor, and explains that he is calling solely on specialists in this line to accept the posts he offers. The major is in charge of the work on gastro-intestinal diseases in the army, and Dr. Calloway has specialized in this work for the past twenty-two years, having been located at Asheville fifteen years of that time. No mention of rank is made in the letter to Dr. Calloway, but it is presumed that the post will carry the rank of captain, with the provision that Dr. Calloway specialize in this one particular work. Major Harris points out that the offer is made to only ten recognized specialists in the line designated, and as usual, Asheville is the residence of one of the men selected.

Dr. Calloway stated last night that, despite financial sacrifices he would be compelled to make, he would gladly do his bit in this service, providing conditions were such that he could leave his practice at the time.

Dr. Calloway will probably go to Washington today or tomorrow for a conference with Major Harris.
