MARKET NEWS

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—Cotton goods markets became stronger and more active during the week. Advances taking place in several instances brought prices to the highest levels of the year. There is nothing like a boom in buying, and very little speculation, most operators continuing purchases to actual needs that are well defined and that have been deferred because of the uncertainty in the raw cotton outlook. It now seems settled that the high cotton is inevitable. Mills are so fully supplied that many of them have declined to quote on cloth, and at different times during the week many goods were withdrawn from sale. Fine bleached cottons have advanced one cent a yard. Print cloths were quiet at the end of the week while sheetings and drills were more active. Colored cottons are very firm. Orders for wash fabrics and white goods from the retail trade for spring delivery in southern and western markets have been coming in freely and in larger volume than a year ago. Mills are unable to secure a full production in consequence of labor conditions, while in eastern manufacturing centres another wage advance of ten per cent. goes into effect in some places on Monday.
