NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 30.—War news put cotton higher today and caused enough buying to keep prices at a net advance until the close, aithough during the afternoon there was a reaction based on predictions of bearish statistics in the government reports on condition and similar Wednesday. Opening at the advance the market rose until the trading monilis were 41 to 50 points higher than Saturday's close. The reaction pared this gain down so that final quotations for the day were at a net advance of eight to 21 points.

The weather map was regarded as decidedly favorable because it showed no rain in the cotton country but builtish traders pointed out that temperatures were below normal in some sections while the forecast was still lower temperatures in the western half of the belt.

Highest prices of the day were reached following the quoting of spot prices 37 points up, which put midding to \$2.25 as compared with \$2.25 as the high price of the day on Octover contracts. In the last half hour of trading, however, the market rebeived little support from any quarter.
