DEALS FALL TO SMALLEST TOTAL IN A FORTNIGHT

Comparative Dullness Attributed to Announce ments of President.

NEW YORK, Oct. 8.—Irregular strength, much of which was dissipated in the final hour, attended the moderate volume of operations on the stock exchange teday, dealings falling to the smallest total of any full scassion in the past fortnight.

The comparative dulkness was attributed mainly to an announcement made early in the day of President Wilson's intention of make public a statement dealing with the peace proposals of the central allies after the markets close.

Interest concentrated to an unusual degree in shippings, trading in marine preferred at an extreme gain of 4½ points far exceeding the inquiry for any other issue. Marine common and the six per cent bonds also were strong, foreshadowing completion of the long deferred deal with British interests.

War shares radied very generally during the morning from their recent heaviness, all the leading steels and equipments recording gains of 1 to 1 points, with reverse movements in some of the 'peace' insues, notably oils, the latter breaking sharply towards the end.

American Telephone again led related utilities to higher levels, but coppers were irregular on intimations of advarse trade conditions. Inactive specialities developed an uncertain trend and rails ignored the excellent crop report, which surpassed recent forecasts.

Impending developments abroad accounted for renewed weakness in exchange to neutral accumtries, Spanish remittances established a new minimum. Dealings in bonds were large, but confusing. Liberty 3½ is reacting to par, while internationals were firm, Prench government 5½ is amounting to the year's record quotation at 101%. Total sales, par value, aggregated f10.875,000.

Old United States bonds were unchanged on call.
