When the influenza epidemic struck the country and wiped out our warehouse and jobbers' stocks almost overnight, we were faced with the problem of distributing—to the stricken districts—in the quickest possible manner—our daily output of VapoRub. We solved this by offering to ship direct to the retailers in these influenza districts, by parcel post prepaid, quantities of not more than three dozen VapoRub in any one shipment, and by shipping what was left from our daily production to our jobbers by express instead of freight.

This was costly, but it solved the problem for the time being. Now, however, we find that these small shipments are constantly increasing—we have received as many as 1,306 in

Low Cost Menus

- Breakfast: Creamed Fish, Spider Corn Bread, Coffee.
- Luncheon: Buckwheat Griddle, Fried Potatoes, Jelly, Pear Sauce, Tea.
- Dinner: Baked Slice of Ham, Potato Cakes, Cakes, Boiled Beets, Indian Pudding, Coffee.
- Breakfast: Spider Corn Bread—Beat two eggs, add two tablespoons of sugar, two cups of milk, a cup and a half of cornmeal and a quarter of a cup of water. Do not stir. Bake half an hour.
- Luncheon: Buckwheat Griddle—Mix two cups of buckwheat flour with two cups of milk, table spoon of molasses, and two teaspoons of baking powder. Stir well and bake well in small cakes on a hot well greased griddle. Serve with maple syrup.
- Dinner: Baked Slice of Ham—Wash and wipe the ham, dredge with flour into which a little dry mustard has been mixed. Place in a baking pan cover with milk and a teaspoon of brown sugar. Bake until brown and tender.
- Indian Pudding—Scald two cups of milk and pour over half a cup of corn meal. Add half a cup of molasses, half a teaspoon of ginger, and a little salt. Turn into a baking dish and add a quart of skimmed milk, cover and bake in a slow oven five hours. Do not stir while baking.
