Miss Dana plays the part of an almost clueless bride on a most embarrassing honeymoon. The plot is so clever and so ingeniously filled with comedy surprises, that it seems unfair to divulge it, lest the enjoyment of the spectators be marred by a fore knowledge of what it is all about.

Suffice to say that it has to do with a pair of adoring and extremely youthful lovers who embark on a honeymoon in a hazy content, while their parents have learned that perhaps they may not be married at all. The shocked and horrified parents set out to overtake them, but they reach a mountain hotel ahead of their elders and prepare for the spooning they have waited so long for, when they are the victims of a series of interruptions that are as disconcerting to them as they are mirth-provoking.

Those who were looking forward to a real treat when Lester Richards and Ben Reed took the boards at the Majestic in a dual black face role found themselves in no manner disappointed by the production showing "Bud and Henry in Society." The work of these two comedians is clever throughout and carries the house from first to last. Their team work is deserving of much credit. Laughs abound in their repeated sallies.

The show opens with a pleasing tableau in which southern melodies by male and female singers are a feature. Fred Brigman, the Asheville lad with the big bass voice, greatly pleases his audience with his rendition of old time songs, and the tenor solos of Glover Davis justify the applause they receive. Sam Lupo, with chorus supporting him, is next heard from, and Babe Reed and Ethel Bell, in song and dance give a creditable account of themselves.

Not taking account of the comedy furnished by Richards and Reed, the show is well worth attending in order to hear the Critter quartet, composed of Davis, Reed, Lupo and Brigman. The audience appreciates their harmonies to the full. Richards' imitation of a cello brings down the house and is one of the cleverest stunts he carries in a well stocked repertoire.

Fatty has a place on the program, backed by the mounted police whose efficiency may well be doubted as one views the rapid chase that takes place on the screen. In the end, of course, he saves the heroine, snatching a keg of dynamite just before it explodes, thus winning her hand. Mabel Normand plays the part of the heroine with her usual vivacity.

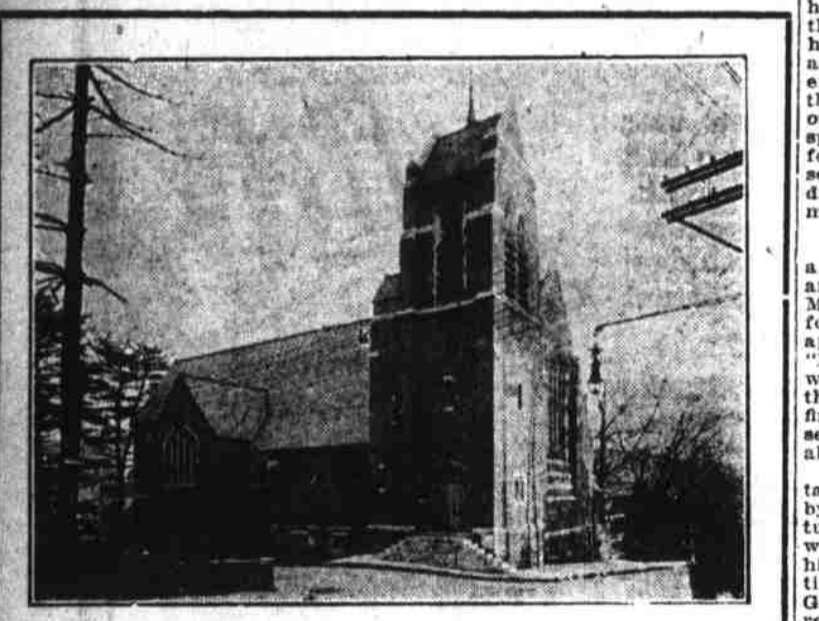
