She practiced medicine in West Chester for a number of years and during the war was a member of the War Work council, national board of the Y. M. C. A., U. S. training corps activities, Dr. Katherine F. Davis, Women's division.

Dr. Morris will hold her lectures at the auditorium of the new high school. She is assisting in the health program which is being established in North Carolina. Her work is entirely under the government, the Y. M. C. A. is only assisting the government in securing places for the lecturers.

### ASSIGN MINISTERS AT TODAY'S SESSION


Services Tomorrow Will Close This Year's Conference of the N. C. Wesleyan Church Here.


The deceased had been in ill health were made by leading people of the denomination. The conference will close with services tomorrow.
