The North Carolina Good Roads association is making a special effort this year for a state-wide system of hard surface roads. Officials of this organization state that with the extraordinary improvement in transportation through motor vehicles and the special improvement in the trucks for handling freight, which is so rapidly displacing the horse, that a permanent road for the main arteries of transportation is absolutely essential to the business interests of every county in the state. As a matter of fact, the improvement in the trucks and the handling of heavy loads over roads has advanced far ahead of the building of roads sufficient for this new means of transportation. It is stated. The volume of business offered the railroads for handling is far beyond what the railroads can handle so that the improved highway is now absolutely necessary if the volume of business being done by the owners of the rural district and the business interests of the cities is to continue.

J. J. Nichols, chairman of the highways division of the board of trade urges every business man in Asheville to carry a membership in the North Carolina Good Roads association. The highways division at a meeting some time ago decided that the state organization should have the support of every automobile owner, good roads enthusiast and business man of Buncombe county. Mr. Nichols stated last night that every one of the 2,278 automobile owners in Buncombe county should be a member of the North Carolina Good Roads association. It is expected that the Good Roads association will meet in Asheville in 1920 and it is hoped that Buncombe county will show the biggest membership to the association of any county in the state.

SHEEP IN BUNCOMBE CO. WORTH LESS THAN DOGS

To Protect Sheep Raisers, the New Dog Tax Law Will Be Rigidly Enforced.

The 2,164 sheep in Buncombe county are worth \$10,383, and 1,549 dogs are estimated to be worth \$11,207, according to official statistics. In other words the dog raising industry involves a greater amount of money than does the highly necessary production of wool, at least such is apparently the fact in this county.

Whether legislators of the last general assembly had such facts before them is not known, but if they did not the North Carolina legislators were familiar with conditions at any rate, when a special tax on dogs was levied.

In 1918 when dogs were only listed as personal property and not for a special tax, 345 were listed in the county. In the same year there were 1,650 sheep listed with a value of \$5,250. By comparing the figures on sheep it is ascertained that a larger number were raised in 1919 than during the previous year and that the value considerably increased.

Under the new act of the general assembly owners must pay a tax of either one or two dollars, according to the age and specie, on every dog kept, and the revenue derived from this taxation will be applied to the school fund of the county in which the tax is collected. Persons failing to make the proper list of dogs will be subject to conviction of a misdemeanor and to a fine not exceeding \$50 or imprisonment not exceeding 30 days.

Recently considerable interest has been aroused among stock men in raising sheep and it is expected that the number raised next year will exceed the number in the county this year. It is understood the profits from the wool each year pay for the raising of a sheep and that therefore a sheep is an annual dividend paying proposition.
