

CLUB AT BILTMORE FOR SICK SOLDIERS

EPISCOPAL CHURCHES TO MAINTAIN QUARTERS.

Cafeteria, Reading and Rest Rooms—Part of Work Resulting From Nation-Wide Campaign.

The first important undertaking to be started in Asheville as a result of the nation-wide campaign of the Episcopal church, is a club in Biltmore village for the use of the men in the government hospitals, which hopes to open its doors early in January.

Mrs. Vanderbilt has most generously given the club the use of the old parish school building, which makes an ideal club house, and an enthusiastic committee of women is working vigorously on the furnishing and fitting up of the rooms.

It is planned to have a reading and smoking room, where books and magazines and games will be found, and a cafeteria where light refreshments will be provided at a very small charge. The club house will be open from 2 to 5 in the afternoon, and from 7 to 9 in the evening, under the charge of ladies from the three parishes, and it is hoped that it will prove to be a thoroughly pleasant and friendly place for the convalescents to pass some of the hours that are apt to hang very heavy on the hands of men who are sick and away from home.

The club is to be known as the Church Canteen club. The board of governors are: S. P. Ravenel, president; Miss Rachel Howland, secretary; Curtis Bynum, treasurer; Mrs. C. E. ALL WORKERS HAVE NOW BEEN APPOINTED.

Work of Taking Census to Start Jan. 2—Will Make Daily Reports.

Corsey C. Buchanan, of Sylva, census supervisor of the Tenth district, has announced the additional appointments of enumerators for all the district, outside of Asheville and Buncombe, the workers for the city and county having been named several days ago.

The enumerators will begin work on January 2. Mr. Buchanan states, and in Asheville will finish in fifteen days, while the workers in the rural sections will be allowed 30 days in which to complete the job. Daily reports of every enumerator will be sent to Mr. Buchanan's office and he in turn will send the reports to Washington.
