The number mailed to that state was 88. and totalled \$65,835.89. The number sent to North Carolina was 27, and the amount, \$21,796.40. South Carolina drew 24, for \$19,533.35; Tennessee, 47 for \$38,157.45. and Virginia 27, for \$19,907.82.
