WASHINGTON, Jan. 1.—Announcement was made yesterday, Tuesday,
by Director R. G. Cholmeley-Jones,
of the bureau of war risk insurance,
that on December 24, the day the
Sweet bill became a law by the signature of the President, the bureau
mailed out 1,065 checks for compensation, totalling \$799,580.61, and representing adjustments in keeping. with the retroactive features of the new law for the benefit of former service men disabled as the result of injuries or illness incurred in active service in line of duty. The largest number went to New York, which, of course, had the larg-est number of men in the service. The est number of men in the service. The number mailed to that state was 88, and totalled \$65,835.89. The number sent to North Carolina was 27, and the amount, \$21,796.40. South Carolina drew 24, for \$19,533.35; Tennessee, 47 for \$38,187.45, and Virginia 27, for \$19,907.82.




