

**TEACHERS WILL MEET  
IN GREENSBORO JAN. 30**

Conference of Mathematics Teachers Will Be Held at North Carolina College for Two Days.

The North Carolina conference of Mathematics Teachers will meet on January 30 and 31, at the North Carolina college for Women. The sessions will be held in the physics lecture room, McIver building. The program (subject to change) will be as follows:

Friday evening at 8 o'clock, address by Professor L. C. Karpinski of the University of Michigan on the "History of Algebra."

Saturday, 10 a. m.—Business meeting.

11 a. m.—Address by Professor Karpinski on "Methods and Aims in the Study of Mathematics."

12 m.—Report on the first two years of high school mathematics. This report (prepared by the national committee on mathematical requirements) will be summarized by Miss Irene Templeton and discussion will be invited. The national committee is asking our conference to cooperate with it in its work.

1 p. m.—Adjournment for lunch. 2:30 p. m.—Address by Professor Karpinski on "Practical Applications of High School Mathematics."

The administration of the college state that the college will entertain women teachers of mathematics from Friday afternoon to Saturday afternoon, inclusive, provided such guests notify them not later than January 28. These teachers should go to the Spencer building on their arrival. The usual hours are 7 a. m., 1 p. m., and 6:15 p. m.

It is believed that the meeting will be one which no teacher of secondary mathematics can afford to miss.

**STATE CONFERENCE FOR  
NEAR EAST RELIEF DRIVE**

Many Notables to Deliver Addresses at Meeting January 19.

(Special to The Citizen.) RALEIGH, Jan. 17.—An elaborate program has been arranged for the state conference of American and Syrian relief workers in this city Monday, January 19, at which time Governor Bickett and officials of the Near East relief from New York headquarters will appear. The conference will be an all day affair with a luncheon in the Yarrowburgh hotel. State Chairman George H. Bellamy will preside.

This conference is a preliminary to the opening of the relief campaign in North Carolina February 1. This state has been asked to raise \$200,000 for the relief of suffering Armenians and Syrians and for the adoption of orphans of the near east. The organization has been practically completed with a chairman in every county of North Carolina. The work will be headed by Col. George H. Bellamy, United States marshal, with the assistance of an executive committee composed of Governor Bickett as chairman, Dr. Clarence Poe, Superintendent E. C. Brooks, Dr. Livingston Johnson, Dr. James Y. Joyner, Dr. D. H. Hill, Joseph G. Brown, Col. Albert L. Cox, Henry A. Page, Mrs. C. C. Hook, Mrs. B. H. Griffin, W. C. Crosby, W. A. Cooper and Robert A. Brown.

Letters received at Raleigh headquarters indicate that nearly every county in the state will be represented at the conference. Secretary of the Navy Daniels was invited but will not be able to attend. He will have a message for the chairman and other workers.

The speakers from the New York office will be Dr. George H. Hyde, John W. Mace, Mrs. Florence Durys and Mr. James C. Arroll. These workers are now on a tour of the southern states in the interest of the near east relief.

The conference will open at ten o'clock in the morning and continue throughout the day. A luncheon will be given at the Yarrowburgh hotel at which time Mr. Mace, Dr. Hyde and Col. Albert Cox will speak. Mrs. Durys will conduct an afternoon session especially for the women.

Although the drive will not start until next month, reports from different chairmen are very encouraging. Many donations have already been made and the different county workers anticipate no delay in reporting their communities "over the top."

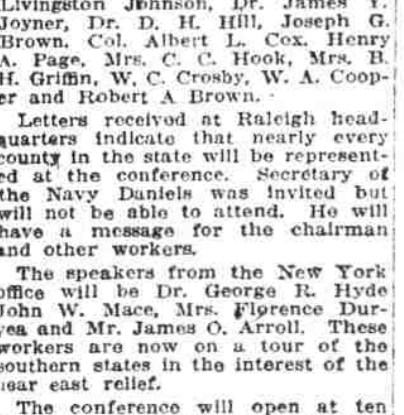
